

In the year 2002, the Community Technology Foundation of California made grants in four program areas:

Community Building to catalyze community change and connectivity through technology for broad community advocacy, civic involvement, civil rights, and public policy.

Community Economic Development to increase access to technology-related knowledge or training that enhances economic self-sufficiency through workforce development, asset building or micro-enterprise and small business assistance.

Education to increase life-long learning opportunities for communities and individuals by increasing understanding and ability to apply learned knowledge through the use of technology.

Health to provide and enhance community-wide access to health services, information, and networking to promote community wellness.

Incorporated in 1998, CTFC promotes social justice, access, and equity through community technology. The ten-year, \$50 million SBC/PacBell Fund of the CTFC was established from the merger of SBC and Pacific Bell. To date, nearly \$16 million in grants have been awarded to directly benefit California's underserved communities, in partnership with 250 grantees.

A funding partnership with The California Endowment provided partial support of the Capacity Building Initiative. Support was also provided by the California Wellness Foundation.
